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
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Student attendance is critical during mandatory state testing times.

Did you know...

Kindergarten and Preschool Registration are happening NOW!

If you have a child (or know of someone who has one) who is ready for kindergarten, please encourage them to register NOW in the Horizon office (between 7:00am - 3:30pm).

Age requirements:

ENFOLL NOW! Preschool & Kindergarten Fegistration

Kindergarten - must be 5 years old before Sept. 1, 2018 PreSchool - must be 4 years old before Sept. 1, 2018

Immunizations are REQUIRED for Kindergarten admission & also for kids going into 6th grade.

Check with our health office if you have any questions about required immunizations.

The Teacher's Corner...... What's Going on in Reading Class?

The "Daily 5" is something you may have heard your child mention. So, what exactly is Daily 5? Let me explain. The Daily 5 is a system for organizing a Reading classroom. It is a structure which allows teachers to teach more effectively while allowing students more time to practice the skills they are being taught. The kids practice their reading skills in 5 specific ways (hence, the "Daily 5"). Here's how it works:

- 1. Teacher teaches a "mini-lesson" (approx. 10 min. of direct instruction) to the class. The mini-lesson comes from the Indiana Academic Standards for the grade level.
- 2. Kids have time to practice their reading skills during Daily 5 rotations
 - a. **Read to Self** (kids read a "just right" book at their independent level the more minutes kids spend reading, the better they read. This is important stuff!)
 - b. **Read with Someone** (kids partner read with a buddy; they help each other, compliment or critique each other's oral reading, and practice taking turns and sharing...also important stuff!)
 - c. Listen to Reading (kids listen to fluent reading on the computer or iPad)
 - d. **Word Work** (this includes practice of sight words, Fundations skills, Greek/Latin roots, vocabulary, word patterns, and more!)
 - e. Write about Reading (kids respond in writing about what they are reading...sometimes they summarize a story or chapter, write about the characters, how the story made them feel, etc. they can write about their reading in many different ways!)
- 3. While kids are doing their Daily 5 rotations, the teacher meets with small groups of students for targeted, specific instruction on skills those kids need most. Sometimes small group instruction is reteaching going over previously taught skills. Sometimes it is enrichment, giving kids opportunities to s-t-r-e-t-c-h themselves in new ways. Either way, kids get the instruction and support they need. It's FUN, too!
- 4. Groups rotate every 10-15 minutes or so, depending on the grade level. Teachers check in with kids, give reminders or new directions, celebrate successes, or handle classroom "situations" (like getting someone a band-aid) in between rotations.

Many of Horizon's teachers use the Daily 5 structure, or a modified version of it. Often in older grades, they call it the Daily 3 (Read to Self, Word Work & Write About Reading) which is more appropriate for their age and skill level.

STAMINA

In order for kids to be successful during their Daily 5 rotations, they must have **STAMINA** to stay on task, keep reading the whole time, and not get up and wander around or interrupt the teacher during small group instruction time. Does your child have **STAMINA**? Can they stick to a job/task without losing focus? Do they give up or lose interest quickly? These are things we work on all the time at school - and you can work on them at home, too! Give your child a task you know they can do independently. Tell them to do it for 10 minutes without stopping, walking away, or chatting with someone. If they can do it, that's great! Next time, try 12 minutes....then 15 minutes, etc. Did you know that some of our Kindergarten kids have built their reading stamina to more than 20 minutes....wow! As kids get older, their stamina should build. It's not out of the question for 4th/5th graders to read uninterrupted for 40 minutes or more

Good News from First Grade










Third Grade News

Each year at the beginning of March, school children kick off National Reading Month by celebrating the birthday of the beloved Dr. Seuss. With help from <u>Read Across America</u>, their goal is motivating kids to read every day of the year.

But what about the little ones? With a little help, they can enjoy National Reading Month too.

Activities to foster important early skills

- Sing the Alphabet Song. The number of versions on iTunes alone is testament to its enduring appeal.
- Hunt for environmental print. Start a game of I-Spy and have your child search for letters prominently displayed on signs, posters, billboards, even cereal boxes.
- Play with alphabet letters.
- Introduce nursery rhymes and sing-along games
- Enjoy rhyming books.
- Go on a treasure hunt. Help your child search for items in your home that rhyme, or start with a certain sound
- Tune your child's ears to the rhythm of music. Clap or dance to a beat.
- Paint with water. Grab a bowl and a couple of paint brushes or sponges and "paint" letters on the sidewalk or wooden fence.
- Scribble in Sand. Use fingers or small sticks to draw letters in the sand.

With the assurance that even the youngest children are on the road to reading, here's to embracing March as National Get-Ready-to-Read Month and building on these important foundational skills well beyond March 31st.
