Checkout Policies:

I get this question a lot: "How many books is my student allowed to check out at a time?

Here is a rundown on checkout policies:

-<u>Kindergarten</u>: 1 Paperback book from a specific location chosen by Mr. Selmon and 2 Phonics Readers (also known as "books in a bag") if wanted, and books are checked out for 1 week.

<u>Grade 1:</u> 1 Hardcover (from the shelves) or Paperback book from specified location chosen by Mr. Selmon and 2 Phonics Readers (also known as "books in a bag") if wanted, and books are checked out for 1 week.

<u>Grades 2 AND 3</u>: 2 Books from any shelf (except reference) and 2 Phonics Readers (also known as "books in a bag") if wanted, and books are checked out for 2 weeks.

<u>Grades 4 and 5</u>: 3 Books from any section (except for Reference), and books are checked out for 2 weeks.

4th grade SHINING STARS!

Our 4th grade students have been working diligently to develop strong work ethics. In 2017 the fourth grade teachers started an incentive program to reward students for organization, time on task, and personal responsibility. The program was proven successful and is being implemented again this year. This Horizon Sunshine Incentive Program requires students to earn 12 teacher's signatures on a Sunshine card for exhibiting desirable work ethics. Once a Sunshine card is completed, the student's name is placed in a weekly classroom drawing for a small prize such as a pencil, pen, eraser, or bookmark. Two or three weekly prizes are awarded by the classroom teacher. At the end of 9 weeks all completed Sunshine cards are placed in an all 4th grade drawing. Our first 9 week drawing was very exciting, as there were probably 200-300 completed cards to draw from, and of course the prizes were more valuable. Two students were awarded \$10 Target giftcards provide by the PTO. Vincent Winkleman and Greyson Gobel were the lucky winners.

Other prizes included, books, crazy socks, flashlights, binoculars, key chains, and notebooks. As you can see from the photo there were a lot of hardworking and happy boys and girls this 9 weeks. Keep up the good work 4th graders!
