Student of the Month

Please dress your child for the weather!

It's that time of year when it is now too cold for shorts, t-shirts, and bare legs. Remember, we go outside for recess every day unless it is raining/wet or BELOW ZERO, so your child should be dressed accordingly. When the snow comes, children must have a winter coat that zips, hat, gloves, snow pants and winter boots in order to play in the snow at recess. Children without proper winter gear will play on the blacktop only.

More CAR RIDER REMINDERS:

 <u>Always let the buses in/out of our driveway</u>. If you see a bus trying enter or exit our parking lot, please be courteous and let them in/out so they can get where they need to go.



- 2. <u>Please put your cell phone down</u> during drop off and pick up times. We are trying to avoid collisions in line.
- 3. If it is 7:50 or after, and there are no traffic assistants outside, you must PARK your car and walk your child(ren) to the office to sign in, because our supervised drop off at Door B has ended. Never park along the curb and send your child in alone. This is a major safety concern.
- 4. <u>Make sure that your child is ready</u> to get out of the car as soon as you come to a complete stop along the sidewalk. Kids should NOT be eating breakfast as they get out of the car. They need to have their coat on and all belongings ready to go when it's time to get out.

IMC News you can Use!

It comes as no surprise that children love school holidays! Being free of the restraints of going to school every day and being able to relax is a valuable part of growing up. Regular reading time, which is a part of our children's school day, often comes to an end during vacation, with so many other activities, gatherings, and fun things going on. So, please take note:

Research has shown that when kids put down school books on their breaks, their reading ability drops with it.

Here are some tips to make sure your kids stay engaged over the school winter break!

- 1. <u>Make reading time fun (and quick!</u>)-You should aim for no more than 10 minutes. Make it fun but using character voices and overly large movements.
- 2. <u>Visit bookstores and the local library</u>-They often have kids storytimes as well as books to check out. This can be another way to get your kids to love reading over breaks.
- 3. <u>Allow children to choose what they would like to read.</u>-Book Choice is vital to reading success. While we want kids to read books that are within their Lexile range, we also want them to read book they will enjoy. Compromise and have them read one that is within their range but also something like a graphic novel that is outside of that range.
- 4. <u>Have a "screen-free" night</u>-Devices will be given as gifts but for one night everyone takes out a hard copy of a book and reads.
- 5. Give books as gifts.
- 6. <u>Read together using supportive strategies</u>. Allow them to choose how they would like to read: either with you or by themselves. Silently or aloud. If they come to a word they don't know or are unsure of, give them a chance to struggle with it before you help them.
